President Pat Long announced early last week that Dr. Brian Posler has accepted her offer to become Baker's new Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs/Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences beginning July 1, 2012. Brian and his wife, Christy, and their children, Tom (13) and Emma (11), are excited about moving to Kansas...and even more excited about the opportunity at Baker.

Following an extensive search process, the feedback from faculty, staff, students, administration and the Board consistently pointed toward Dr. Posler as the first choice. Brian's embodiment of Midwestern values and understanding of the Baker community immediately appealed to the committee. Brian's academic background, his energy, his experience and his ability to connect and contribute to the University's strategic plan implementation were strengths that Dr. Long consistently heard throughout the search process.

Dr. Posler currently serves as the Associate Provost for Academic Affairs at the University of Southern Indiana (Evansville, IN). A Manhattan, KS native, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree with distinction from Cornell College (Mt. Vernon, IA) with a dual major in Politics and American History. He earned his Master of Arts and Doctorate in Political Science from Rice University (Houston, TX).

## Hartley Gift to Mulvane Announced....Expansion to Mulvane Named in Honor...

Baker President **Pat Long** made a surprise announcement during the 2012 Scholarship Gala and Auction on March 3 in Overland Park. Her announcement was that of a extremely large donation from **Ross '70** and **Christine Hartley** of Jackson Hole, Wyoming in the amount of \$1.6 million. The gift was given to the Ivan L. Boyd Center for Collaborative Science Education. It was also proclaimed that the 9,000-square-foot expansion to Mulvane Hall would be named "Ross and Christine Hartley Hall".

"We enjoy giving back to the University," said Ross, a 1970 **Baker** graduate and former member of **Baker's** Board of Trustees who had a successful career working with his father in the family's insurance company and co-founded NIC, Inc., a leading provider of electronic government services in the U. S.

As a student, Ross took several classes—math, chemistry and physics—and labs at Mulvane. He and his wife strongly believe in the \$10.3 million transformation of Mulvane, essential to preparing the next generation of scientists.

Though not a **Baker** graduate, Ross's wife, Christine, has an undergraduate degree from Bethany (KS) as well as a nursing degree from KU. She fully supports and understands well the need for **Baker** to be successful in funding this facility and how this expanded centre for research and the study of science will greatly enhance **Baker's** ability to recruit, retain and train the best and brightest students for a career in a science related field. "I think anybody who gives philanthropically always discovers that they are the ones who gain the most pleasure, even more than the recipient," Christine said.

## Greek Alumnae Council Founded...

Over the past year sorority advisory board and corporation board members from all National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) groups at Baker University have been meeting with Dr. Pat Long and other Baker administrators regarding recruitment and other issues facing sororities. All alumnae involved feel this has been extremely beneficial in addressing issues together with the university, the office of Greek Life and also in assisting with communication between all sorority alumnae as we try to come together to insure the continued strength and collective viability of NPC sororities on Baker's campus.

A concern of sorority alumnae was that this positive momentum and improved communication might not continue with the passing of time, change of administration, or change of individual house advisory boards and corporation boards. Consequently, a small group of alumnae from each active NPC sorority met to discuss how to formalize this communication vehicle for the future. As a result, this new alumnae group was formed.

Dr. Long and other university administrators were presented with a mission statement and overview of this proposed council for Baker and it was enthusiastically received.

The new Greek Alumnae Council made a presentation to introduce itself to Baker Panhellenic collegiate members in February. It will sponsor its first event, a parent and prospective student information session as part of BU Weekend in late March. Six alumnae, two from each sorority, will hold a social and informational session at Collins House designed to promote the benefits of sorority membership and answer questions. This will be an "all-Greek" presentation, with no identification of any alumnae participant's chapter membership.

Future events are planned to assist with promoting Greek life in general on the Baker campus and to bring larger groups of sorority alumnae together in collective efforts to strengthen and preserve the Greek system at Baker and encourage unity among all sorority alumnae.

## Wandering Wildcats Trip: June 17-29, 2012...

The Wandering Wildcats are anxiously awaiting the arrival of June and their exciting cruise to the Greek Isles. Each month in the Arbor I have been highlighting one of the ports of call on this trip. To date I have written about Venice Italy, Dubrovnik Croatia, Corfu, Olympia, Athens and Mykonos, Rhodes and Santorini Greece as well as our stop at Kusadasi (Ephesus) Turkey. This month we learn about the Crown Princess' final stop (other than to disembark in Rome) at Naples, Italy....

Located along the beautiful west coast of Italy, Naples is the capital of the region of Campania and of the province of Naples. It is known internationally for its history, art, architecture, music, and gastronomy, and has played an important political and cultural role both within and beyond the Italian peninsula throughout its 2,800-year existence. Naples' historic city centre is the largest in Europe, covering 4,200 acres, and is listed by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site. Over the course of its long history, Naples has been the capital of duchies, kingdoms, and one Empire, and has consistently been a major cultural centre with a global sphere of influence, particularly during the Renaissance and Enlightenment eras. Naples is the jumping off point for day travel to the Isle of Capri, the Roman ruins of Pompeii and travel further down the beautiful Amalfi coast to Sorrento and Positano. In 2011, Naples had a population of 957,465.
