### **Baker** Top-Ranked Kansas University in U.S. News & World Report's Midwest Category...

**Baker** University was recently thrilled to learn of its ranking among regional Universities as reported in the 2012 edition of U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges and Universities. In the report released this past month, **Baker** was ranked No. 26 in the Midwest Regional category — the highest-ranked Kansas university in this category. Regional Universities are defined as schools that offer a full range of undergraduate programs and some master's programs but few doctoral programs. This region includes schools from Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota and Wisconsin. The top five Universities in this category were: Creighton, Butler, Drake, Valparaiso, and Xavier. Here is the link to the complete Midwest rankings:

### **Baker** Judged to be Military Friendly Again...

G.I. Jobs, the premier magazine for military personnel transitioning into civilian life, has awarded **Baker** the designation of Military Friendly School once again. The 2012 Military Friendly Schools list honors the top 20 percent of colleges, universities and trade schools that are doing the most to embrace America's military service members and veterans as students. In its effort to help student veterans find the right school, G.I. Jobs incorporated a survey of student veterans for the first time. This feedback provided prospective military students with insight into the student-veteran experience at a particular institution based on peer reviews from current students. The 2012 list of Military Friendly Schools was compiled through extensive research and a data driven survey of more than 8,000 schools nationwide.

In response to the story of the **Baker/Ottawa** Bell incident of 1958, Kurt Cooper '89 sent this story as related by his mother who was a student at **Ottawa**... "It was the fall of 1958. I was a sophomore at **Ottawa** University. It was the most important football game of the year as we were playing our arch rival, **Baker** University! I don't remember the score, but **Baker** won (editor's note: 6-2 in a mud bath) and we were dismayed. As we stood on the track near the end zone, we noticed that **Baker** students were going for the goal posts. Two unknown **Baker** guys were standing by and protecting a big bell that had rung out loudly on their touchdown. They started to run toward the goalposts and said to anyone close by, "watch our bell". At that moment two **Ottawa** upperclassmen shouted "sure" and then said to me and another **Ottawa** student "here, hold our coats" and off they went carrying the bell with them. That's the last I saw of the bell. The other girl and I hurried out of the area. For several days the mystery continued. Where was **Baker's** bell? Some **O.U.** students enjoyed singing "Who's got your ding dong...Who's got your bell? Somebody knows, but nobody tells!!! Who's got your ding dong...Who's got your bell?" The administrations of both schools were upset to say the least. It finally came to light that one of the men who took the bell put it in his brother's basement. The embarrassing part for **Ottawa** was that the brother was a professor at **O.U.** I don't know how it was resolved, but I do know that the **Baker** men got the bell back and it surely made a memory that none of us who were there have forgotten." As Paul Harvey would always say... "And now, you know the rest of the story!" :)

## James Houston Turner's Book Signing...

A native of Baldwin City, James Houston Turner '69 returns to his alma mater this October 7th for a reception and book-signing on campus. Following graduation and a "few other involvements", James turned to writing fiction. Much of this came as a result of years he spent (in his own words) as a smuggler behind the old Iron Curtain. During that time he was on a KGB watch-list, organized secret midnight meetings with informants, located hidden mountain bunkers, and investigated legends of forgotten tunnels buried beneath the cobblestones and bricks of some of Central Europe's most venerated cathedrals...much of which now plays as a backdrop to his novels. James lived for a while in Los Angeles and after contracting cancer, moved to Australia with his wife, Wendy. There he was able to receive the life-saving surgeries and treatments that has allowed him to continue on with his writing.

He is currently on a U.S. tour promoting his most current paper-back thriller, "Department Thirteen". His tour will stop in Baldwin on the Baker Campus on Friday, October 7th where he will have a press conference followed at 3:30 by a reception that is free and open to the public at Collins House. He will make some brief remarks and answer questions followed by refreshments and an opportunity to purchase his current work through the Baker Bookstore. ## How to Make a Charitable Bequest...

During this continuing time of turmoil in the markets—and with uncertainty at hand on future taxes, medical expenses etc., it is understandable that many people who would like to be in a position to support **Baker** financially simply can't...at least for now. This is where the charitable bequest can play an important role!

With a gift given through your trust or your will you can play an important role in shaping the future of the University—without parting with assets that you or another family member might need late in life. Moreover, a gift given like this is free of federal estate taxes, as well as inheritance tax in most states.

**MANY OPTIONS FOR GIVING ARE AVAILABLE:** How you give is up to you. A charitable bequest can take any of a number of forms. You can give a fixed sum of money or specify a specific piece of property, or you can give a percentage of the residual value of your estate once all the other bequests to heirs have been fulfilled. A contingent gift is one that is made only if the named beneficiary (whether a person or an organization) otherwise noted in your estate plan fails to survive you.

**OFTEN CHARITABLE BEQUESTS ARE MADE IN HONOR OR MEMORY OF SOMEONE:** This could be the donor, a family member, a former professor that had an impact on the donor's life/career or any other loved one.

**YOU CAN CONTROL EXACTLY HOW THE GIFT IS UTILIZED BY **BAKER**:** By simply stating within your estate planning document that you want the use of the bequest to benefit (for example) scholarships, capitol projects, the annual fund or, perhaps, that it is to go into a general endowment fund, you can be assured that **Baker** will use the gift exactly as you have decreed.

**IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR LEAVING **BAKER** IN YOUR WILL/TRUST:** It is best if you use a statement similar to the one that follows. "I give to The Trustees of the **Baker** University, 618 Eighth St, Baldwin City, Kansas 66006 the sum of (\$\$\$\$\$). It is understood that the University shall apply this bequest to the (program/cause or need you decide is important)." If you choose to create an endowment, you may elect to have the corpus of the fund remain either unrestricted or restricted. If you choose to restrict the earnings on the endowment you create, be sure to add language that details that use...(Example: "The annual earnings from this fund are to support Student Scholarships in the Department of Business").

**BY INFORMING ME OF YOUR INTENT, YOU QUALIFY FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE UNIVERSITY'S PULLIAM ENDOWMENT SOCIETY.** This membership group receives a distinctive lapel pin and are honored in the University's Endowment consecration program in May that most closely follows the announcement (or receipt) of the bequest. Such information received shall be held in strict confidence!
