Advancement Offices to Move to Former Phi Mu House...

Many of you no doubt received a communication last month from President Pat Long in which she detailed a decision by the University to enter into a one-year rental agreement for use of the former Phi Mu house with the National Council of that sorority. In case you didn't receive that message or were unable to read the communiqué at that time, the following is a synopsis of the details contained in that previous note:

The University felt that it was important to ensure the integrity of the space until such time that Phi Mu determines whether re-colonization is possible. We have been told that re-colonization is not an option for at least three years and we were concerned about having an outside entity (apartment owner or other business) occupy the building with the accompanying chance for neglect for the structure or grounds.

Responses From Previous **Arbors**...

In addition to sending a list of the books he has written, Jon-Christian Suggs '62 wrote about some of the connecting points his extended family has had with **Baker**...

"Blanche Wise, my aunt, was a Phi Mu from Pitt State and was the longtime head of the Maple Leaf Committee and was tied closely to the Phi Mu's at **BU**. My grandmother, Elva Emery, was a house mother for International House in the 50s and before that ran the "Corner Café" in the 40s, a favorite spot for **Baker** students. My uncle Joe Emery graduated in '53 and long before him, my great aunt Phoebe babysat for President Wilbur Mason's children in the early 'teens. One of those children, Miriam, had two daughters who went to **Baker**, one of whom, Gwendolyn, I married in my senior year. Aunt Phoebe went east to Boston University and later became a Methodist missionary in India for several decades."

Chris continued with a story of a prank...

"I think it was in my freshman year--the fall of 1958--that the boys from **Ottawa** stole the **Baker** bell. Carloads of us young stalwarts went off to **Ottawa** to take it back. We "stormed" the campus only to find ourselves surrounded and outnumbered. The police came and I think Dean Gessner had to retrieve us from jail. I hope you get other versions of this as I would like to get the story straight in my own head."

From Cecil Miller '53... "During World War II, Wood Hall was heated by a coal furnace and house boys lived in the basement to fire the furnace. There were so many fires in Wood Hall, that every time a fire whistle blew, everyone said, "Wood Hall is on fire again"."

And finally from Anita (Camp) Buchanan '84/'99... "I was a student 1980 - 1984, and MBA '99. I have fond memories of **Baker**, and am proud that my daughter, Paige Smith, will be a freshman on campus this fall!" Ironically, I just returned from a trip to Alaska with my family, and had a wonderful trip as well! Welcome, Paige!!!

The acquisition of the structure will help offset the need in the spring of 2012 for additional classrooms as we complete the Mulvane Transformation project. By moving the Advancement Office (Development, Alumni and Constituent Relations) to the Phi Mu house, we will be able to reconfigure two former classrooms in Constant Hall from administrative space to classrooms once again.

Housing Advancement in the Phi Mu House will also allow us to pilot an Alumni Center concept. The center will then be available to be used to host alumni events and can be used for a myriad of different types of meetings as there are lots of spaces within the house that can be scheduled for meetings and small gatherings for staff, faculty and students. The facility will also be open during Alumni Weekend. We are hopeful our Phi Mu alumnae will choose to use the house at STAG to continue their annual gatherings.

Once the painting and move-in are completed this fall, Advancement will be hosting an open house. We are committed to maintaining the building in a way that will honor the history of our Phi Mu Chapter as we move forward in planning for the future.

Wandering Wildcats Trip: 2012...

The Wandering Wildcats trip that has been featured each month for the past several continues to garner interest. With 35 individuals signed up to date and several more interested, we plan to have a great time on a fantastic itinerary in the Greek Isles. Each month I am highlighting one of the ports of call on the trip. To date I have written a little about Venice, Dubrovnik, Croatia and Corfu, Greece. The next stop the Crown Princess will make is Katakolon (Olympia), Greece.

Olympia Greece is just 20.5 miles away from the port arrival town of Katakolon. It was the site of the original ancient Olympic Games, which were celebrated every four years by the Greeks. Olympia was situated in a valley in Elis, in western Peloponnisos (Peloponnesus), through which runs the Alpheus River. It was not a town, but only a sanctuary with buildings associated with games and the worship of the gods. Olympia was a national shrine of the Greeks and contained many treasures of Greek art, such as temples, monuments, altars, theaters, statues, and votive offerings of brass and marble. Today, the temple of Zeus remains as just one of many excavated temples of significance that visitors can visit while in Olympia.
