Course Description:

Baker University Continuing Education, in exclusive partnership with the AECT's Teacher Education Division, is offering graduate credit for participants of the AECT24 Mini Conference. This course is designed for PK-12 educators who aim to leverage technology to enhance teaching, learning, and student engagement. The AECT24 Mini Conference will delve into key technology topics such as virtual and blended instruction, artificial intelligence, technology integration, and ongoing support for teachers as technology evolves. Through professional development and networking opportunities, the conference seeks to equip PK-12 educators with the resources and support needed to adapt to the rapidly changing technological landscape.

Some questions to incorporate into your paper could include what was gained/learned from the session, how will you use this information in your work, as well as thoughts and ideas you have from the overall conference that may impact or change your professional and/or personal beliefs and practice.

Attendance Expectations: Participants must attend the 2024 KSDE Annual Conference that includes attendance at a minimum of 1 General Session, 1 Keynote, and 5 Breakout Sessions. Baker University policy prohibits a candidate from earning credit if more than 30% of a course is missed.
